## INTERVIEW OF BARBARA AND KEN DUGAN

- 2 MS. CLANCY: Okay, we have the tape rolling. This
- 3 is Gwen Clancy running the camera today. It's April 21,
- 4 2011. We're in Crescent Valley, and Abby Johnson will be
- 5 conducting the interview.
- 6 MS. JOHNSON: My name is Abby Johnson. I'm the
- 7 Nuclear Waste Advisor for Eureka County, Nevada. We're doing
- 8 the Eureka County Lessons Learned Video Project, and we're
- 9 going to be interviewing Barbara and Ken Dugan.

- MS. JOHNSON: So, how did you come to discover
- 13 Crescent Valley and how long have you been here and why did
- 14 you stay?
- MRS. DUGAN: We originally started out in Battle
- 16 Mountain in 1964, and he leveled the first alfalfa land in
- 17 the Reese River Valley 50 miles south of Battle Mountain, and
- 18 then we went back to North--well, South Dakota and then North
- 19 Dakota, and we had our own business in North Dakota. And,
- 20 after being up there--well, this was for 14 years, our
- 21 prospects of jobs was running out, and then he went to work
- 22 for Brown and Ruit, and the McCluskey Canal, which was an
- 23 irrigation canal that was supposedly to take water from Lake
- 24 Sakakawea in Central North Dakota to the Red River Valley,
- 25 and he was a drag land operator and Brown and Ruit got the

- 1 contract for the Clipper Mine southwest of Crescent Valley
- 2 here, and they asked him if he would be willing to come down
- 3 and run a shovel. And, he come home and told me that and I
- 4 said, "Let's go." Because I loved it out here when we was
- 5 here in '64. And, so, in July of 1978, we come down here,
- 6 and after the winters in North Dakota and about 100 degree
- 7 below zero wind chill factors, the winters are, well, there's
- 8 no winter here, and we stayed and we've been here 33 years
- 9 now this summer. And, we've done all kinds of things. Ken
- 10 worked in the mines. He worked for Brown Ruit at the
- 11 Clipper, and Cortez.
- 12 MR. DUGAN: Helped build the road to the top of
- 13 the--
- MRS. DUGAN: Yeah.
- MR. DUGAN: The mine up there.
- MRS. DUGAN: Horse Canyon Mine.
- 17 MR. DUGAN: Horse Canyon, yeah.
- 18 MRS. DUGAN: And, then, in '85, we decided we was
- 19 going to cut firewood full-time, so we ended up in Oregon,
- 20 and brought firewood down. And, in '86, we come down and
- 21 Brown and Ruit wanted to know if he would go to work at the
- 22 McCoy Mine south of Battle Mountain, so then he ended up
- 23 going back to work there. Worked there a year, and what was
- 24 it, '87 he went to work at the Colby Mine south of Crescent
- 25 Valley here. And, then we was back in Oregon in, well, 1990

- 1 went back up and cut wood again. And, that was the last
- 2 paying job he had. He more or less retired from the mines,
- 3 and we've been cutting firewood, commercial, selling it, and
- 4 somewhat retired. And, that's the reason we're still here,
- 5 because we like it, we like the area, and just love it down
- 6 here.
- 7 MS. JOHNSON: When you first heard about the
- 8 possibility of a nuclear waste rail line coming through
- 9 Crescent Valley, what was your reaction?
- 10 MRS. DUGAN: I just didn't like it. It was too
- 11 much danger in nuclear radiation leaks. And, it just didn't
- 12 make sense. I don't know, it was just one of those things
- 13 that--
- MS. JOHNSON: And, you must have gotten involved
- 15 with the group that was working, Joseph Carruthers and others
- 16 who were part of the Beowawe/Crescent Valley Nuclear Waste
- 17 Awareness Committee?
- 18 MRS. DUGAN: Yeah. Yeah, because it was brought
- 19 up, you know, the dangers of it, well, the freedom of travel
- 20 back and forth across the Valley, what kind of corridors they
- 21 were going to have. Then, the safety aspects, because I've
- 22 been on the ambulance for 31 years now, and so then we were
- 23 involved that way, and it just--I don't know quite how to put
- 24 it, it just didn't make sense to transport that kind of stuff
- 25 through this area when the areas that were keeping it

- 1 couldn't just keep it in their own backyard.
- 2 MS. JOHNSON: Let's move on to the next question.

- 5 MS. JOHNSON: You have been in Crescent Valley a
- 6 long time, so maybe you're familiar with the real estate,
- 7 sort of dream in the desert land sales that occurred. Could
- 8 you tell us a little bit about that?
- 9 MRS. DUGAN: Well, just from what we heard, I think
- 10 you can explain meeting that guy at the store.
- 11 MR. DUGAN: Well, I was wondering about the lake.
- 12 I mean, somebody, I don't know where he got the information
- 13 from, I have no idea, but somebody really had things beefed
- 14 up around here, you know. He had a boat, you had to have ten
- 15 foot of water to really operate it in, and there wasn't no
- 16 lake that deep, you know, maybe a foot at the deepest.
- MS. JOHNSON: And, he was looking for the lake?
- 18 MR. DUGAN: Yeah, he was hunting for that big lake.
- 19 It was supposed to be just to the south and east of town
- 20 about a mile or so, he had it, and there's nothing like that,
- 21 you know. So, it was somebody just trying to beat people out
- 22 of a lot of money, is what it added up to, you know.
- 23 Whatever happened about it, I know he was going back to look
- 24 for somebody. Whether he ever found them or not, I do not
- 25 know. I never got to see the man again.

- MS. JOHNSON: In the spring of 1999, the Nuclear
- 4 Regulatory Commission held a public meeting in Beatty, Nevada
- 5 to talk about the new radiation standards that they were
- 6 proposing for Yucca Mountain Repository, and you two went to
- 7 that meeting. Could you tell me what you remember and what
- 8 your impressions were from that meeting?
- 9 MRS. DUGAN: There was really quite a group there.
- 10 There were several from Crescent Valley. We went down.
- 11 There was a couple of things that were brought up there that
- 12 I do remember, and one was about an older gentleman there
- 13 that was retired from the Nuclear Agency, and he made the
- 14 comment that if they'd just go ahead and do what they've
- 15 already shown could be done in getting these reacting rods
- 16 burned down, that when they got all done, they could take it
- 17 out and put it in their garden, and there was no fear of
- 18 radiation, and I thought well, gee, why don't they keep
- 19 working on that project.
- 20 And, then, the other thing was Ken brought up, they
- 21 were talking about how safe the canisters were, and he
- 22 brought up that there was no such thing as a safe canister.
- 23 Something fails someplace, sometime. And, they wouldn't
- 24 answer or make any comments. It was cut out.
- 25 And, that's the only things I can really remember

- 1 about the Beatty meeting. But, that one really stood out
- 2 about the gentleman talking about it could be not dangerous
- 3 at all if they'd just go ahead and do what they've already
- 4 found out they could do.
- 5 MS. JOHNSON: Let's move on to the next question.

- 8 MS. JOHNSON: I know that you both went on a tour
- 9 of Yucca Mountain with some other interested citizens. What
- 10 were your impressions and observations from that experience?
- MRS. DUGAN: Well, I can remember when we were up
- 12 on top, it wasn't anything spectacular. They wouldn't really
- 13 get you into where they were digging the tunnel. But, my
- 14 reaction then, and even now, is I can't see it being
- 15 earthquake-proof in that area when they don't know where the
- 16 faults are, and to this day after all the earthquake activity
- 17 down southwest of Hawthorne, and a fault they didn't know
- 18 existed, how come there isn't one down there that's going to
- 19 decide to start moving. That's about the only thing I can
- 20 say. It was just like they rushed you in and rushed you out,
- 21 and that was it.
- MR. DUGAN: Yeah, that was about it.
- MS. JOHNSON: Okay.
- 24 MR. DUGAN: They hurried you through as fast as
- 25 they could.

- 3 MS. JOHNSON: On the tour, did you feel that the
- 4 Yucca Mountain officials that were giving the tour were as
- 5 open about what might be wrong with Yucca Mountain as well as
- 6 what they think is right about Yucca Mountain?
- 7 MRS. DUGAN: I got the impression that everything
- 8 was good, and they did not give you any information on the
- 9 dangers that might be. They claimed everything was perfect.
- 10 There was no danger to the water. There was no danger of
- 11 earthquakes to break it open or anything. They did a cover-
- 12 up on the information because they wouldn't have anything
- 13 negative. It was all positive in their point of view. Do
- 14 you agree?
- MR. DUGAN: I agree with that.

- 18 MS. JOHNSON: Eureka County has maintained a
- 19 neutral position regarding Yucca Mountain all along. They
- 20 have not taken a position in favor of the repository or in
- 21 opposition to the repository. Do you agree with the County's
- 22 position of neutrality?
- 23 MRS. DUGAN: I think they should take a position
- 24 because of where the train routes can go. I thought they had
- 25 taken a position with the Pine Valley route originally. Now,

- 1 maybe I'm wrong, but I just think they should take a position
- 2 against it because of affecting the land and the people,
- 3 because the Valley, the railroad supposedly will go right
- 4 through, the last thing I saw was between the mountains, and
- 5 Crescent Valley here. And, that's--I think they should take
- 6 a position, yes.
- 7 MS. JOHNSON: And, if the Carlin Nuclear Waste Rail
- 8 Route is revived, that is if Yucca Mountain is again
- 9 considered to be a viable project and they need a way to get
- 10 the nuclear waste on rail lines, and they start to look at
- 11 the Carlin corridor again, what would your reaction be?
- MRS. DUGAN: I'd be against it definitely. And,
- 13 they--what happened to the Caliente railroad? I mean--
- MS. JOHNSON: Well, Caliente is still in first
- 15 position, but the people we've spoken with, the
- 16 transportation expert from the State, Bob Halstead, and our
- 17 transportation advisor, Rick Moore, both say that enough time
- 18 would have passed, that everything would get a fresh look.
- 19 And, since this is the only north/south route with the least
- 20 obstacles, because of the way the mountain ranges run in
- 21 Nevada, they both feel that it would be under consideration
- 22 again.
- 23 MRS. DUGAN: Well, I think they should follow
- 24 through with what that guy in Beatty had mentioned, that he
- 25 knows that they can take care of that stuff. And, we didn't

- 1 ask for this nuclear stuff, so they've got to keep it where
- 2 it was and is. That's my opinion.
- 3 MS. JOHNSON: Thank you.

- 6 MS. JOHNSON: You had mentioned the earthquakes in
- 7 Hawthorne. Can you tell us a little bit about what's going
- 8 on there today, and how it might relate to Yucca Mountain?
- 9 MRS. DUGAN: Well, these earthquakes were brought
- 10 up right after the big one in Japan, and all of a sudden they
- 11 come on the news that they were having earthquakes in
- 12 Hawthorne, and they were just located southwest of town in an
- 13 area of no civilization, and I just wondered with Yucca
- 14 Mountain, and this was an unknown fault, they never knew
- 15 there was a fault there southwest of Hawthorne, and how many
- 16 of these unknown faults are there that they don't know about.
- 17 And, that big area down, well, all through Nevada, there's
- 18 faults everywhere. And, they're working with setting up
- 19 seismograph instruments in the ash flow there at Hawthorne,
- 20 and I know they've talked about the ash flows around Yucca
- 21 Mountain, that it just makes me wonder just what's going to
- 22 happen.
